## Literacy and Numeracy

Years 7 to 9 are studying media texts at the moment. They have been really surprised and, in some cases, *disgusted* to learn that the word 'ugly' has been removed from some editions of Roald Dahl novels. They were also shocked to learn that some of the novels we study at East Loddon have been banned in some US states because of their content.


Within children's literature, the issue of censorship is a delicate matter. Striking the right balance between shielding young readers from potentially problematic content and preserving the essence of storytelling is complex.

In Dahl's case, modifying his text may affect the complexity of his characters and their development.

This debate prompts us to consider the consequences of censorship. While it's important to protect children, it's equally vital to promote critical thinking and open discussions about the themes and language in children's literature. Finding a balance that respects both childhood innocence and the integrity of classic works is an ongoing challenge.

Moreover, stories play a vital role in shaping a child's moral compass. Engaging in conversations about these changes with your child is incredibly valuable. Discussing the choices authors make in storytelling can help them understand the subtleties and power of language and how it has changed but also how society has changed.
