**Professional Learning Communities Initiative – Learning Intentions Focus**

In 2016, College staff worked as part of Professional Learning Teams to work on a range of strategic priorities of the College. One of these core priorities was to develop an East Loddon Teaching and Learning Model, which provided a consistent and high-level framework to be used across the entire College. The teaching and learning model devised by staff is known as 'ILEARN', with staff agreeing that this is the model that we implement throughout all College classrooms.

This year, our College has been accepted into a Professional Learning Communities Initiative which sees myself, Mr Wilkinson and Mr Vernon attend a series of training days (as we did again last Monday and Tuesday) in which we are schooled in the most effective ways to work in learning communities. Being that we have agreed as a staff to implement our new ILEARN model, this has become a focus for our PLC. Throughout the remainder of the year, we will be largely focussing on whether our ILEARN model is actually being embedded into our College. Our key focus at this stage is on one part of the model, known as 'Learning Intentions'. Over the past 3 weeks, Mr Wilkinson, Mr Vernon and I have been conducting very small interviews with students from Prep to Year 12, to ask a couple of simple questions such as –

Do you know what a learning intention is?

Do you know what the learning intention of your current class is?

Do learning intentions actually help you with your learning?

I encourage all families to ask their school-aged children about learning intentions, as well as our ILEARN model. All students should know about ILEARN, and also should be able to talk about learning intentions. I would be interested in hearing any feedback on these items also.

# Assistant Principal's Report

## Assistant Principals Report

Hey Winter! Enough is enough. Shoot through until next year. It's Spring time hooooooray. Get ready for footy finals, get ready for netball finals, get out the antihistamines, get ready for Christmas decorations in the supermarkets (I'm not kidding, you watch as soon as AFL Grand Final is done). Another good sign of the start of Spring, is that it's Father's Day this weekend. I can't wait to get my socks and chocolate that my wonderful children put so much thought in to buying each year. Thanks so much to our wonderful Breakfast Club volunteers who provided Bacon and Egg morning breakfast this morning. Mr Leed missed out, and boy was he a grumpy old principal all day. Firstly Hawthorn aren't playing finals, then this. A year of tragedy is slowly unravelling.

In serious news. This year our College has undergone an independent audit of our School Bus System. The audit identified numerous students who are ineligible for free bus travel to school on our system of buses. We were aware of many of these students and they do currently pay a fare (is \$120 per term per child), however, it also uncovered students that our school had previously deemed eligible, as ineligible travellers. This is a problem that as a school we are trying to address. The audit has led to the following

- If your child was previously deemed to be a fare paying bus traveller, they will continue to be issued a fare to pay.
- If your child/ren were not identified previously as fare payers by the College and now have been identified as needing to pay a fare, then they will be exempted from fare paying, unless they change address. If a change of address leads them to remain outside our school zone, they will then be required to pay a bus fare. This is sometimes referred to as a grandfather clause.
- Any siblings of students referred to in dot point 2 will be deemed fare paying students.

The major problem that this could cause for our College is that students deemed as fare payers may choose not to attend our College. This would be detrimental to our numbers. School Council has discussed implications to ensure that East Loddon remains a viable option for students who currently come from areas outside of our designated free travel zone. A school bus policy is attached to this newsletter. I suggest as homework, everyone has a read of this. In short it's implications are as such (exemptions aside)

From this point, if your child is primary school aged, they will need to pay a bus fare to attend our College, if we are not their closest government school.

If your child is secondary school aged and not attending their closest government school, then they will be required to pay the relevant fare. This fare however will be credited to your school account to be used on educational expenses.

Further notices about the implication of this policy will be forwarded to families who are affected by any changes. Please call me if you wish to discuss.

## East Loddon P-12 College SCHOOL BUS POLICY

### **Rationale:**

- Our College is located in a geographically isolated area making it essential that students have access to a school bus service.
- Enforcement of DET School Bus Program Policy and Procedures is a financial deterrent to parents, some of whom have historically belonged in our catchment.
- The enforcement of Bus fare payments for students not attending their closest government school, will impact our student numbers and in turn affect our capacity to run current school programs.
- A 2017 Audit of the East Loddon bus system initially identified 71 students (30%) as those who should pay a bus fare to attend our College using our bus system. In 2017, we collected fares from 21 students (9%).

### **Aims:**

- Regardless of regular fluctuations in our student population, we aim to ensure that East Loddon P-12 College's current student numbers are not impacted by a family's inability to pay a bus fare.

### **Implementation:**

- The result of the 2017 audit, saw an end to any historic arrangements that existed with regard to East Loddon's bus system, hence from this point, students not attending their closest government school are required to pay a bus fare.
- This audit saw some students given a one off exemption from fare payment. This exemption will continue as long as the student resides at the same address as during the audit.
- The College will enforce payment of a bus fare from any student/family who is deemed ineligible to use our school bus system, according to either the rules stated in DET School Bus Program Policies and Procedures Nov 2013 or the 2017 audit.
- The payment amount is determined by DET and PTV and is currently \$120 per student per term.
- Ineligible travellers must pay a fare at the beginning of each term if they wish to access our bus system.
- **For secondary aged students (years 7-12):** On providing proof of payment of the bus fare, the college will credit the student's school account to the equivalent dollar value. These funds may then be used for educational expenses (camps, excursions, incursions) that occur during that school year.
- Payments that have been made for bus fares, will not be exchanged for cash.
- Payments for bus fares will not carry over to the next school year.
- Places on the school bus for fare paying students are subject to availability. Priority for places on the bus is given to eligible students first. If a bus reaches its capacity of passengers, then fare paying students can not be guaranteed a place on the bus and may be asked to access a different bus service. The remaining places which will be allocated to fare paying students will be assigned according to enrolment date and receipt of payment
- On exit of the school part way through a term, refund of unused credit relating to bus fares, will not be made.



### **Evaluation:**

- This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three-year review cycle.

### Prep Letter in Focus

The 'qu' combination is a focus for this week. When these sounds combine they make the 'kw' sounds respectively, as in 'queen' and 'quiet'. The consolidation letter is the 'x' which is made up of the 'ks' sounds blending together, as in 'fox'.

Following along the Healthy Bones theme, the words we are talking about are: calcium, milk, cheese and yoghurt.

### LITERACY WEEK

### Literacy Hints-

**Developing Prediction AND Monitoring skills in Reading.**

As we read our mind is thinking forward, and we start predicting language based on meaning (drawing upon our experiences, direct and indirect, to connect with the theme of the text) and structure (awareness of how our language flows). The latter really clarifies the importance of modelling and promoting good sentence structure. A few letters (visual and phonemic) further inform the reader as to what some of the potential options may be. This allows the young reader to make an 'informed guess' but it is absolutely essential that the reader then confirms the accuracy of the prediction, again thinking about meaning, sentence structure and the sounds. Always allow your child to read to the end of the sentence and if they have done nothing in terms of monitoring the accuracy of their predictions, ask them to reread:

*You said, '.....' Did that make sense?*

*You said, '.....Does that sentence sound right?*


*You said, '.....' Have a close look at the letters again, does that word look like .....*

Remember that when students are sounding through words it is essential that they still have in mind the other two strategies (meaning and structure) and that rather than just saying letter names they start putting sounds together in manageable chunks (Chunky Monkey). It is also helpful that when they sound through the word and it doesn't sound right, they consider 'flipping the vowel', for example, use the long vowel sound rather than the short alternative ('e' as in 'egg'

doesn't sound right so I should try the 'e' as in 'emu'. Phonemic spelling is very complex in English is essential but very demanding because of the number of different options (we have 44 sounds), a reason why we are sometimes very reliant on meaning and sentence structure (context) to help with working out some words.

### At a Glance 3+3= IMPROVED ACCURACY/ MEANING/ SUCCESS

Don't forget to **remind your child to reread the sentence** once they have detected and fixed an error so



that they re-establish the flow of the language and comprehension.



Wow!!! What a MAD Milkshake Day and incredibly fun time for all involved. Lunchtime at the College on Tuesday was an incredible hive of excited students anxiously waiting to receive their yummy milkshakes as part of our Healthy Bones Week celebration.

Many thanks to Leanne Welsh, Linden Barry and Dianna Linton for helping make the milkshakes, their energy was impressive, stepping up to the challenge in the creation of over 200 frothy milkshakes. Linden generously supplied the ice-cream and toppings for which we are very appreciative. Mr Kidman's ability to co-ordinate and control the crowd was beautiful to watch as our polite young people patiently queued, making the activity a huge success. Mrs Lister's Prep Class provided a beautiful art display of 'milkshakes' as well as a poem which was fabulous!

The Wellbeing Team represented by Wendy Twigg and School Nurse Denise Leed were delighted to see the enthusiasm of students enjoying the milkshakes. Denise is concerned that research reveals that many young people don't meet their recommended daily calcium intake, that calcium plays an important role in building strong bones and emphasised how easy it is to get the calcium that they need by enjoying foods from the dairy group every day.

The Recommended Dietary Intake (RDI) for calcium is between 500 and 1300 milligrams per day, depending on your age and whether you are a boy or a girl. To reach their RDI of calcium, most children need to eat or drink three serves of dairy every day.

One serve of dairy is equal to one small piece, or two slices, of cheese (40g), or one tub of yogurt (200g), or one glass of milk (250ml). [www.dairy.edu.au/discoverdairy](http://www.dairy.edu.au/discoverdairy)
